

INTRODUCTION


Welcome to the sixth annual Desert Con Film Festival. This year Desert Con will be only three days long, but they will be packed full of films and guest speakers.








DON DAVIS TREEOR

Don Davis works for the U.S. Geologic Survey and has done artwork for JFL, NASA and the Ames Research Center. His paintings have graced the covers of such esteemed magazines as SCIENCE, AMAZING, ASTRONOMY, FANTASY AND S.F. and SKY AND TELESCOPE. ROBERT BLALACK

Robert Blalack started his involvement in films at the Slade School of Fine Art in London, England in 1968. In 1975, Praxis was commissioned to supervise the miniature optical photography for STAR WARS.

JAMIE SHOURT

Jamie Short started his special effects career by doing the ABC Logos in 1969. The method for doing the Logos was slit scan photography for television commercials. Later he directed photographic effects for ANDROMEDA STRAIN, and worked with Douglas Trumbull in the making of SILENT RUNNING. Jamie Shourt was a camera man and a computer expert for the film STAR WARS, and did the computer controlled explosions for the pirate ship.




RICHARD EDLUND

Richard Edlund, commissioned by John Dykstra, was the first cameraman for the miniature special effects crew for STAR WARS. He became interested in films through the Navy because of equipment accessibility. Later, he started his own lab. He attended USC for two years, obtained jobs doing STAR TREK and OUTER LIMITS episodes through the department's office, and got more experience working on 7-up's "Bubble Butterfly" commercials. His expertise is a welcome addition to our con.









The ANDROMEDA STRAIN is about Earth's first biological crisis. A satellite falls to Earth in the remote area of Piedmont, New Mexico. When the recovery team arrives in Piedmont they find everyone dead except an infant and an old derelict. The satellite, child, and old man are taken to a five-story underground lab. At the Wildfire station a team of scientists fight against time to determine the nature of the deadly microbe before it starts a world-wide epidemic.

THE BLACK CAT



A young couple, traveling through Hungary on their honeymoon, meet Lugosi, who plays Dr. Predergast, on a train and agree to go with him to a nearby village. An accident forces them to seek the abode of Karloff, who 19 years earlier was Predergast's rival in love. Karloff places the young woman under a spell and prepares to sacrifice her. Lugosi, learning that his dead wife's body has been kept by Karloff, and that his supposedly dead daughter is not only Karloff's wife but participant in the typically satanic rites involved, frees the young man imprisoned by Karloff, but is shot when the young man misinterprets his efforts to free the young woman. With his dying breath, Lugosi frees the couple and activates a time delayed charge which destroys the castle. In the dawn's light, the couple walk to the village to continue their honeymoon. This is one of the few joint films in which Lugosi's performance matches Karloff's.

In this, the origional Blob movie. a 35¢ rubber meteorite crashes near an American city, releasing a creeping terror which grows by engulfing anything resembling organic matter, including most of Steve McQueen's friends. These bright, clean cut, vibrant youths unsuccessfully attempt to warn the town of the growing terror. The tension mounts for the projectionist as his alter ego in the film is visited by this intersteller garbage disposal through the air duct in the projection booth of the theater, eventually dining on the aud-

ience. The town now realizes the error of its ways, all is forgiven, friendship and comraderie prevail as they battle the common foe. Unfortunately, the common foe is relatively impervious, and about the size of a diner. The runny mass of cherry pie filling is luckily found to freeze at low temperatures, and is henceforth shipped to the artic, there to lie till the sequel.







Destination Moon is considered to have started the great boom in SF films of the fifties. It centers its story around the construction and flying of the first moom rocket. The special effects are near impec-


cable as is usual in a George Pal film.

The film FANTASTIC VOYAGE is set in the year 1995 when a Czech scientist tries to escape from behind the Iron Curtain and is attacked by enemy agents. Furing the attack he aquires a severe brain injury, which cannot be treated by normal techniques. A team of scientists and an atomic submarine are reduced to the size of a bacterium, and injected into the scientist's blood stream. With the aid of the submarine the scientists travel through the blood stream to the brain to fix the injury, but there is a catch. They only have 60 minutes to repair the damage to the brain, and along the way the scientists are attacked by antibodies and there is an attempted sabotage of the mission.




THE FLY

After many failures, success was made in his experiment to transmit tissue. 


DR. STRANGELOVE

2001: A Space Odyssey is Stanley Kubrick's sixth feature film, and has become the landmark from which all other science fiction films shall be judged. Hailed as a masterpiece and a spectacular failure, 2001 opened to mixed and hostile reviews. One point that the critics and public all agreed on; the film had set a new standard for motion picture special effects. No science fiction film had ever been done on such a grand scale since "King Kong". Inventing new special effects processes as the production progressed, Kubrick created the most visually stunning film to hit addiences in decades. It also introduced a new element into the high budget science fiction film, and that was philosophy. The God concept is the heart of the film. In the depiction of alien intelligence, Clarke's Third Law, "Any sufficiently advanced technology is indistinguishable from magic" (God) is fitting. Although beginning to show its age a bit, 2001 will continue to invoke a sense of wonder and beauty.

Kubrick's vision of a world gone mad graces the silver screen at Desert Con for the first time. As the title implies, DOCTOR STRANGELOVE: OR HOW I LEARNED TO STOP WORRYING AND LOVE THE BOMB is a nightmare comedy of infinite hillarity. A mad general declares war on Russia because the Dreaded Commies are responsible for "poisoning our precious fluids." B-52's are quickly dispatched from their fail-safe points to obliterate selected targets as a race to stop the approaching doom ensues between the cornball characters. Sexual metaphors abound: "If you try any perversions in there, I'll blow your head off!" Critically acclaimed upon its release, DOCTOR STRANGELOVE features excellent directing, scripting, cinematography, and, of course, great acting. Peter Sellers gives his best performance in his portrayal of Dr. Strangelove, President Mirkin Muffley, and Major Lionel Mandrake. The film also boasts such fine actors as: PeterBull (Ambassador DeSadesky), Sterling Hayden (Deneral Jack D. Ripper), Slim Pickens (Major "King"Kong), George C. Scott (General "Buck" Turgitson), and Keenyn Wynn (Col. "Bat" Guano).



Forbidden Planet is by now the classic example of what a science fiction movie should be. In 2200 A.D. United Planet Cruiser C57 D is dispatched to Altair 4 to rescue an expedition lost 20 years before. Captain Adams(Nielson) discovers that Dr. Morbius (Pidgeon) and his daughter Altaira are the only survivors of the expedition. Morbius has uncovered, and is seeking to understand, the records of the Krell, à long lost race, destroyed in one night. However, it appears that the cruiser's arrival has revived the danger that destroyed the expedition. Fine acting, especially by Pidgeon and Robby.

This film is the classic beauty and the beast story with a difference. Fay Wray plays the beauty, and a 50' gorilla, Kong, is her playful suitor. Found on the isolated Skull island with dinosaurs and savages as co-habitants, Kong is captured by a movie director and brought to New York for exhibition. Kong has been stricken with love since he



first caught sight of Fay Wray tied as a sacrifice to him, the natives' god. In an attempt to excape and unite with his love, Kong demolishes downtown New York and makes his famous last stand atop the Empire State Building.




The Incredible Shrinking Man is one of the few films which transcends the typical 1950 "B" picture genre. Shocking critics of 1957 with its philosophical overtones, it has gone on to winning a place in science fiction history. The story concerns Grant Williams as he finds himself a victim of a strange unknown disease. The effects of his malady become apparent as he begins to shrink at an ever-increasing rate. Of course, the doctors have no cure, and Williams becomes too small to do anything except take up knitting in the doll house which has become his new abode. Narrowly escaping an attack by the family cat, Williams is taken for dead by his wife. Forgotten by family and friends, Williams is left to fend for himself. Competing for food with the insects, he leads a spartan existence. As the film concludes, the viewer is left with a sense of wonder as the last symbolic shots appear. Endowed with an excellent script by Richard Matheson, and the intelligent directing of Jack Arnold, The Incredible Shrinking Man is one of few films to establish science fiction as an art, rather than a gimmick.

THE POINT is an endearing animated story of a round headed boy born into a world where everyone else has a point on their heads. The various characters he meets along the way finally lead him to the conclusion that everyone has a "point" to their life, whether they have a point on their heads or not. The basically self interested Dr. of the book is transformed into a "saviour" for the small town of Abalone. 

have proven worthwhile.


The giant "American Airlines Spacefreighters" berkshire, Valley Forge, and Sequoia, are a part of a fleet of spaceships carrying the last remaining plant and animal life of Earth, are riding in solar orbit in the vicinity of Saturn. A message from home orders the crews to destroy the vegetation hemispheres and return to Earth. Conservationist Freeman Lowell (Bruce Dern), apparently the last of his breed, decides to act to save the last forest.

The film is both a psychological study of an individual facing up to the loneliness of space and a powerful statement on the fragility of nature's ecology. The final scenes are



THX 1138

Before Star Wars, Before American Graffiti, there was THX-1138. Originally a short film project, and later expanded, THX-1138 deals with the nominal "hero" of the same name who begins to question the system. THX's world consists of endless white corridors patrolled by robot police. The conformity of the society is symbolized by the white uniforms and shaven heads of all but the robots. Following an attempt at rehabilitation by the authorities, THX makes a bid for freedom, during which his friend and companion is killed. THX finally reaches the outside world, bathed in the light of sunrise (later copied in Logan's Run) Whether due to direction or excessive editing, the film is somewhat disjointed and confusing. However, the film should be seen, even if just for curiosity as to what Lucas did before.

The innkeeper survives long enough to clue our hero in on the inn's shady secrets before getting shot, leaving Gray to shield the "normal" sister and battle the villians. Gray's attempt to salvage the vampirized sister via a blood transfusion net him a slight case of madness along with some frightening, symbolic nightmares.





STAR WARS SPECIAL EFFECTS DEMONSTRATION

STAR WARS is one of the biggest motion pictures of 1977. On March 25, 1977 the film was released across the United States, and within one week Star Wars became a smash hit. On Sunday March 5 there will be a Star Wars slide presentation.

STAR WARS contains some of the most complex multi-element travelling matte composites undertaken in the history of Hollywood effects production. To produce the 365 miniature optical shots, it was necessary for the optical workers to generate 14,000 pieces of film. All the miniature optical composites were produced in one generation of duplication, using three color seperations and high-resolution matte stocks.

The miniature optical photography required two years to complete, including the time required to construct specialized equiptment for optical printing in VistaVision. During the final six months, the optical crew was working six days a week, in two eleven hour shifts. It is the results of their work which contribute to the realistic look of the composite optical photography.


EXHIBIT HALL

We invite you to enter, enjoy and please don't feed the bouncers.



THE L-5 SOCIETY


